

PERMITS NEEDED

Accesses from Highways

A written permit is required from the selectmen for any access from property to state aid roads and all town roads. Anyone building or wishing to drive to their property from these roads must obtain a permit.

Section 43: It shall be unlawful to develop, construct or regrade any driveway, entrance or approach, or build a fence or building, or deposit material of any kind within, or in any way affect the grade of, a highway right of way, or obstruct a ditch, culvert, or drainage course that drains a highway, or fill or grade the land adjacent to a highway so as to divert the flow of water onto the highway right of way, without a written permit from the Board of Selectmen. (V.S.A. 19: 1-43 Act 460)

Zoning Permits

No building construction or land development may commence, or no land structure may be devoted to a new or changed use within the Town without a Zoning Permit duly issued by the Zoning Administrator as provided for in Section 4443 of the Act. (Thetford Zoning Ordinance Article 8, Section 820)

A sewage disposal system construction permit must be obtained prior to the issuance of a zoning permit for a new dwelling.

On Site Sewage Disposal System

A person before constructing a sewage disposal system shall make application for a permit to construct, to the Local Board of Health, on the prescribed form, accompanied by a \$80.00 fee. A Sanitary Specialist will then inspect and test the proposed site, and give recommendations.

The Local Board of Health must issue a Construction Permit before any construction is done. The Sanitary Specialist is to be notified 48 hours in advance as to the date the system is to be installed, so that he can make an inspection during construction. After all requirements have been complied with, an Occupancy Permit will be issued.

Applications may be picked up and filed with the Town Clerk.

Sub-division

No subdivision of land may legally occur without a hearing before the Thetford Planning Commission. The placing of a second dwelling on a lot constitutes a subdivision (Thetford Subdivision Regulations, Section 2.42). Application forms and copies of the Thetford Subdivision Regulations are available at the Town Clerk's Office. Sometimes there can be confusion over the meaning of the Regulations. The Zoning and subdivision Administrator and/or members of the Thetford Planning Commission will be glad to try to informally answer questions. A subdivider is also welcome to come before the Planning Commission during one of its regularly scheduled meetings to ask questions. Meetings are held the first and fourth Tuesdays after the first Monday of the month, beginning at 7:30 PM in the Town Hall.

Flood Hazard Area Zoning By-Law

A comprehensive Flood Hazard Area Zoning By-Law was adopted by the Board of Selectmen on 31 July 1978. Copies of the new By-Law may be obtained at the Town Clerk's Office.

The legal Voters of the Town of Thetford in the County of Orange, and State of Vermont are hereby warned to meet in Anderson Hall, Thetford Academy, in the Town of Thetford on Tuesday, March 4, 1980 at 10:00 A.M. to transact the following business:

Article I. To elect the Town and School Officers for the ensuing year. (Polls will be open from 10 A.M. to 7 P.M.)

Article II. To hear and act upon the reports of the Town Officers.

Article III. To hear and act upon Part I of the Budget Committee Report in regard to recommend expenditures for anticipated Federal Revenue Sharing Funds in the amount of \$34,887.33.

Article IV. To hear and act upon Part II of the Budget Committee Report and to raise \$122,647.00 for the Highway Budget and \$51,227.40 for the Town General Account. All taxes so raised must be in the Treasurer's Office on or before October 22, 1980 with interest of 1% per month thereafter, plus the five cents warrant fee and 8% penalty.

Article V. To hear and act upon Part III of the Budget Committee Report and to raise \$840,863.34 for the School District. All taxes so raised must be in the Treasurer's Office on or before October 22, 1980 with interest of 1% per month thereafter, plus the five cents warrant fee and 8% penalty.

Article VI. To see if the voters will vote \$1,676.40 to Orange County Mental Health Service, Inc. at \$1.65 per registered voter. (\$1,719.30 was voted in 1979)

Article VII. To see if the voters will vote \$2,844.00 to Community Health Services, Inc. at \$2.00 per capita. (\$2,844.00 was voted in 1979.)

Article VIII. To see if the voters wish to appropriate \$5,200.00 to the Thetford Library Federation. (Their request was for \$8,000.00 or \$4.00 per capita. \$2,800.00 was recommended to be appropriated from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds as in 1976-1979.)

Article IX. To see if the voters wish to appropriate \$500.00 for the White River Council on Aging.

Article X. To see if the voters wish to appropriate \$1,000.00 to the F.A.S.T. for equipment.

Article XI. To see if the voters wish to appropriate \$1,500.00 to the Thetford Volunteer Fire Dept. for boots and radios.

Article XII. To see if the voters wish to renew tax stabilization for the Rices Mills Community Assn., Inc. at \$30.00 for five years.

Article XIII. By Petition

To see if the voters wish to discontinue the east end of Town Road 17 that dead ends at I-91, and deed same to the abutting land owners. One half to each.

Article XIV. By Petition

To see if the voters wish to ban the mining and milling of uranium within the borders of the Town of Thetford.

Article XV. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.



TOWN REPORT WINS AWARD

For many years, the James P. Taylor Memorial Town Report Contest has served to evaluate town reports for certain useful and needed information in a format that could be readily understood. The program has provided town officials with guidelines for helping to prepare an Annual Town Report that meets state statutes governing town reports and provides helpful information to citizens about the business of town government.

Each year, a volunteer team of judges evaluate the Annual Town Reports using the James P. Taylor's ten points of award. This year the judges decided to evaluate the criteria being used and to revamp the contest if it would be helpful to the towns. A committee was formed and they have recommended a number of changes.

The committee established a list of specific requirements which it used as a basis for an Award of Merit and each town was evaluated against the criteria. Town Reports exceeding those requirements and incorporating other reports and information were eligible for an Award of Excellence or an Outstanding Award.

Thetford Town Report was one of six chosen as Outstanding - Receiving 98 out of 100 points.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION AND ADMINISTRATION

The 1979-80 enrollment at the Elementary School has increased again this year, from 230 to 240 students. It is anticipated that at least 250 students will be enrolled in 1980-81. Secondary enrollment has remained stable with 204 students in 1978-79 and 202 students in 1979-80. A decline to 195 students is expected in 1980-81.

The 1980-81 budget is substantially higher than 1979-80. The requested increase is \$166,192. It is significant to note, however, that expenditures for 1979-80 will also be substantially higher than budgeted. This necessary overexpenditure of \$32,051, as you can see, is primarily the result of major increases in transportation (\$7,460), and operation and maintenance of the plant (\$18,125). Both of these areas relate directly to the energy situation. Other areas which contribute to the overexpenditure are legal fees (\$5,800), fixed charges (\$2,684), and debt service (\$6,366). It is most apparent that the contributing costs are not controlled by the Board and that they will continue to be reflected through increases in forthcoming budgets.

The proposed budget for 1980-81 is \$134,141 higher than anticipated 1979-80 expenditures. Of this increase, \$106,715 is anticipated for secondary tuition. The cost of maintaining and operating the 1971 bus has been substantial this year prompting us to include \$12,000 in the budget which, when combined with the \$6,000 budgeted this year, will allow the purchase of a replacement bus. This increase also includes a new teacher to accommodate the increasing elementary enrollment and an amount to cover any negotiated increases in teacher salaries.

In 1979-80 we are required to submit all reports to the State and Federal governments in a revised reporting format. Since this new system is somewhat different from the one we have been using, we are printing this year's budget in both forms. The traditional form will not be used in the next annual report.

Again, all indicators point to a continually improving program with review of the science curriculum receiving major attention this year. Both the Elementary School and Thetford Academy continue to participate in Orange East Supervisory Union programs for Special Education and Gifted and Talented students. The building has been used extensively by over 30 community groups. The Parent Advisory Council has been active and interested parents may contact Mr. Johnston for information.

A special committee has been appointed to review the School Board policy which governs students who wish to attend a school other than Thetford Academy. The committee will make a recommendation to the School Board as soon as possible. We urge all citizens to express their views on this important subject by contacting committee or School Board members. Copies of the policy are available at the School.

Parents are encouraged to visit the School and to participate in School Board meetings. The Board meetings are on the first Tuesday of each month at 7:30 P. M. at the Elementary School.



MINUTES OF THE
ANNUAL TOWN AND SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING
MARCH 6, 1979

Meeting called to order at 9:30 A.M. on Tuesday, March 6, 1979 by the Moderator, Matthew I. Wiencke. The Moderator declared the polls open for balloting on Articles I and II at 9:30 A.M.

The prayer was given by Reverend Gary Wait.

Article III. Motion made that the Town accept the reports of Officers of the Town of Thetford. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Article IV. Motion made to accept Part I of the Budget Committee Report in regard to recommended expenditures for anticipated Federal Revenue Sharing Funds in the amount of \$34,521.26. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Article V. Motion made to accept Part II of the Budget Committee Report and to raise \$102,950.00 for the Highway Budget and \$40,081.00 for the Town General Account. All taxes so raised must be in the Treasurer's Office on or before October 24, 1979 with interest of 1% per month thereafter, plus the five cents warrant fee and 8% penalty. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Article VI. Motion made that the Town appropriate \$1,719.30 to Orange County Mental Health Service, Inc. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Article VII. Motion made that the Town appropriate \$2,844.00 to Community Health Services, Inc. at \$2.00 per capita. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Article VIII. Motion made that the Town appropriate \$4,800.00 to the Thetford Library Federation. Seconded. Motion made that there be a voice vote to this Article. Seconded. Motion made to amend the previous motion to vote by ballot on Article VIII. Seconded. Amendment was not adopted.

A brief explanation of the Thetford Library Federation was given by Dr. Lucius Nye. It is an association of the Thetford Libraries and was incorporated in April 1972 for the main purpose of attracting grants from foundations and the federal government. Thetford Academy, Thetford Elementary School, Thetford Historical Society, Peabody Library and the Latham-Town Library became active members of the Federation. Federal and State Governments and foundations have contributed 46% of the costs of the building the Thetford Selectmen designated as the Thetford Bicentennial Project. The Federation has conducted an annual appeal to pay off the construction loan but utilities, maintenance and insurance costs must be met too. For the past 4-5 years, the Federation has asked the Town Meeting for \$4 per capita to operate the building and are requesting the same amount this year.

Article VIII was carried.

Article IX. Motion made that the Town renew tax stabilization for Thetford Center Community Association at \$50.00 per year for five years. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Article X. Motion made that the Town renew tax stabilization for the Eclipse Grange No. 255 at \$150.00 per year for five years. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

The Moderator called a recess of 25 minutes which started at 10:45 A.M. and ended at 11:10 A.M.

Article XI. Motion made that the Town ratify and confirm a conveyance from the Town to Stephen Marshall and Margaret Marshall dated September 14, 1972 and recorded in the Thetford Land Records in Book 50, Page 124. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Article XII. Motion made that the Town approve the purchase of an \$800.00 radar unit. Seconded.

State Trooper Danford O'Brian explained that the four towns benefitting from this moving radar unit would be Thetford, Strafford, Fairlee and West Fairlee. It would be owned by the Town of Thetford and licensed by the State Department of Public Safety. The Town would be able to collect a portion of fees charged those offenders caught within the town limits.

After considerable discussion, a ballot voted was called.

Favor - 108 Against - 30 Article XII was carried.

It was moved that the meeting be recessed for lunch from 11:50 until 1 P.M.

Article XIII. Motion made to accept Part III of the Budget Committee Report and to raise \$629,200.45 as recommended by the Committee. All taxes so raised must be in the Treasurer's Office on or before October 24, 1979, with interest of 1% per month, thereafter, plus the five cents warrant fee and 8% penalty. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Article XIV. Motion made that the Town authorize the School Directors to apply any surplus in the school construction account to the reduction of the outstanding debt for the school addition. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Article XV. Motion made that the Town authorize the School Directors to convey a right-of-way to William Worcester J., Phillip L. Worcester, Elizabeth Deily and Ruth W. Johnson for a water line relocated during school construction, through the Agent to Convey Real Property. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Article XVI. Motion made that the Town have future annual Town Meetings begin at 10:00 A.M. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

Emily Hood stated that the Polls and the Meeting would begin at 10:00 A.M.

Article XVII. Lawrence Babcock, School Board Chairman, gave a special thanks to Frank Barker, Jr. for his many years of dedicated service to Thetford's School System.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, a motion at 1:15 P.M. was made to adjourn until 7 P.M. when the polls close. Seconded. Voted in the affirmative.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment met in session on ten occasions during 1979 and approved the following conditional use applications: an inn, a garage within the flood zone, a woodworking shop for the manufacture of barn components, an apartment building renovation, a consignment and gift shop, a seven-foot high boundary fence, topsoil removal from a farm, and a woodworking shop and an addition to a residence, each found to be on the periphery of the flood zone. The Board also approved one variance in property line setback for a garage, and additions to five non-complying buildings.

The Planning Commission approved 25 subdivision plats of from two to ten parcels, and five annexations of land to abutting properties. No subdivision applications before the Commission were denied.

The Board of Selectmen approved 12 new driveways.

TITLE 10 V.S.A. 2648 SLASH REMOVAL

(a) A person may cut or cause or permit to be cut forest growth only if all slash adjoining the right-of-way of any public highway, or the boundary lines of woodlots owned by adjoining property owners, is treated in a manner satisfactory to the town fire wardens.

(b) Owners or operators of timber or woodlots shall leave the main logging roads through cut-over areas free from slash so that tractors may pass over these roads unobstructed in order to carry men and supplies and fire fighting equipment to fire suppression crews.

(c) If in the opinion of the town forest fire warden there is no fire hazard as a result of a cutting, he may issue, upon request, a statement relieving the operator of the conditions required in this section.

THETFORD SKI PROGRAM – 1979

The Thetford Ski Program had its best year yet. The relationship with the Dartmouth Ski Way in Lyme, N. H. became firm and friendly. The children were taken by school bus to the Ski Way for eight lessons during the months of January and February. The \$8 fee for the children included ski passes for the 8 Friday lessons and the Carnival. The \$32 instructors' fee included ski passes for the Fridays, the Carnival and 8 lessons with the Ski Way staff.

All the children who could demonstrate an ability to ski under control and could ski through a small course of turns were placed in classes using the chair lift. The Ski Way personnel and customers showed a delightful and helpful attitude toward helping the little ones learning to use the lifts. A new program called "Masters" was initiated this year. At an extra cost to the program and to the students, these advanced skiers took their lessons with Simon Mayer, the head of the Dartmouth Ski Way Ski School. Judging by the smiles and the speed, the program was a success.

A total of 100 children and 15 instructors enrolled in the program. The season started with 43 beginners not using the lifts. By the end of 8 lessons, 34 of these had been promoted "up the hill." One of the beginners, Mark Crossley advanced to E class; Samantha Bragg, Dana McGranaghan, and Eric Lilienthal advanced from "A" to "D". Two other students, Jennifer Stebbins and Herby Hart deserve comment for advancing from "B" to "E" in one season.

The Carnival was directed by Ro and Clem Gritsavage on Sunday, the 4th of March. A total of 92 students participated in the "no stop; no fall" or dual slalom events. Andy Button won the "ABC Slalom" and the Al Snite trophy. Doug Durkee won the "D-E Slalom" for the boys and the Lions Cup; Julie Tallman won the girls "D-E Slalom" and the Elmer Brown trophy. A new trophy donated for the Masters by the Bradford National Bank was won by Stuart Hunt. These four winners also received small trophies to keep which were donated by the Thetford Mothers Club.

The Carnival day and the season were capped off by another new event: a Pot-luck Supper held at the Elementary School. This proved to be a great success and we hope it will become a tradition.

The Ski Program joined with the Thetford PTA in sponsoring a Winter Sports Equipment Sale held at the Elementary School of November 18, 1979. The proceeds were divided by the two groups. We hope this too will become an annual event.

REPORT OF THE STATE REPRESENTATIVE

January 10, 1980

To my Constituents:

This is my second term as a Freshman Legislator and the experience gained during the '79 sessions is standing me in good stead. It seemed so good to see many old friends upon my return to the Legislature on January 8th.

A very business-like atmosphere characterizes the 1980 Legislature as there are many problems that are facing the State of Vermont. There are 300 new bills on the docket, plus what were left over from '79.

The House Ways and Means Committee backs a permanent income tax cut - and also passed a resolution that any rebate of the 1979 surplus shall be returned directly to the individual income taxpayer, proportionately based on his 1978 tax return.

There will be problems to be handled, such as discussion of removal of the ceiling of First Home Mortgage Interest Rate. There will be a very definite attempt to change the funding of funds for education. The Miller formula has been under fire for years and, hopefully, we can do something to eliminate the inequities here. Reform of the Public Service Board will be under scrutiny, along with possible amendments of the Mental Health Statutes. The Right to Work bill will be under discussion.

Our secondary roads need attention in Vermont and we must put the Highway Fund into sound fiscal condition.

There are many, many issues too numerous to mention that will have to have attention in this session. There will be a lot of hard work and long hours put in on the issues.

Again, I want to thank each one of you for my opportunity to serve you. Please feel free to contact me about anything that bothers you. I have faithfully answered each inquiry that has been addressed to me and will continue to do so to the best of my ability. I'm here to serve you, my constituents.

Orange County Mental Health Service is a private, non-profit corporation operating under the guidelines of Public Law 94-63, which requires the provision of "twelve essential services." These services include: inpatient, day care and other partial hospitalization, follow-up care from institutions, transitional halfway house services, 24-hour emergency services, general adult outpatient therapy, specialized services for children, specialized services to the elderly, consultation and education programs, assistance to courts and other public agencies, special programs in the areas of alcohol and drug abuse, and liaison and diagnostic services with all other agencies which regularly deal with the patient and his family.

OCMHS has an important history of local support from the communities it serves (all the towns in Orange County, plus five northern communities in Windsor County). Local funds from towns are used as "matching funds" to obtain revenues from state and federal sources. The following is our report to your town concerning mental health services to the individuals in that town from 11/1/78 through 11/1/79:

It is important to realize that a sliding fee scale is used - thus an individual's fee is set according to his ability to pay. You will note that the amount received from the patient or third party payer plus the amount of town support does not equal the actual cost of service delivery. This "discounted" amount must be made up from sources other than the patient or local community. We are asking that your town assess each registered voter \$1.65 to offset the cost of services to the residents of your town. One thousand sixteen (1,016) registered voters times \$1.65 equals \$1,676.40.

We respectfully request that the above mentioned appropriation be placed in the budget. We welcome your interest and support.

The White River Council on Aging is a private non-profit agency serving an eight town area under the directives of the Older Americans Act passed by Congress in 1965 (and as amended). The Council is funded by Federal monies as well as funds from the United Way of the Upper Valley and from local town and individual donations. A Board of Directors supervises the activities which radiate out of both the Hartford Senior Center and the Woodstock Senior Center. Linda Glasgo, a Thetford resident, is the Director of the White River Council on Aging. Carol Dustin is the Outreach/Advocate Worker for the Hartford Area.

There are between 200 - 300 persons in Thetford who are 60 years of age or older and are eligible to participate in the services and offerings of the White River Council on Aging. During 1979 a total of 93 different persons participated from Thetford. The services received included tax assistance, legal aid, flu shots, social services of many kinds, and the enjoyment and fellowship of sharing a meal with other persons. Through the Thetford Friends Together some 25 persons have participated in the noon meal and informational meetings at the Hartford Senior Center. A once a month trip is planned for 1980. The monthly newsletter prepared by the staff and volunteers at the Hartford Senior Center is sent to all Seniors in Thetford. (Call Bertha Brown 785-2167 if you are not receiving one and wish to do so.)

Expanded Outreach Services and transportation assistance are currently being considered for Thetford during 1980 by the White River Council on Aging.

The Thetford Friends Together organization is offering a Telephone Reassurance Program and Medical Transportation Assistance. Call Rev. Jeffrey Evans (785-2915) if you can use help or if you can provide transportation.

The White River Council on Aging respectfully requests an appropriation of \$500.00 from the Town of Thetford to help in supplementing the Federal funds available.

VERMONT DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH Annual Report to the Citizens of Thetford

The established mission of the State Health Department is to protect and promote the health of all Vermonters. In working towards this goal, the Vermont Department of Health has provided directly, or assured the provision of, preventive health services to communities across the state. During 1979, the following services were received by the residents of Thetford:

237 elementary school children were examined by a dental hygienist and received personal oral hygiene instruction twice during the school year.

The Dental Program monitored the fluoridation equipment of the Thetford Elementary School.

11 persons received services through the Maternal and Child Health Program.

74 comprehensive health assessments including preventive health guidance were provided at Well Child Conferences.

139 persons received nutrition education and food supplements through the Special Supplemental Food Program for women, infants, and children (WIC).

38 children underwent medical evaluation and treatment through the Early Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment Program (EPSDT).

4 women were examined for cervical and breast cancer through the Cervical Cancer Screening Program.

Through the Handicapped Children Program, diagnosis and treatment services for orthopedic, hearing, cardiac, and other conditions were provided to 2 children.

Through the Child Development Clinic, 2 children received diagnostic and intensive follow-up services for suspected physical and/or mental retardation.

91 immunizations were given in Health Department Clinics.

6 persons received chest x-rays for early detection of lung disease through the Barre, Rutland, or other Health Department chest clinics.

The following services were provided by the Health Department Laboratory in Burlington:

3 blood tests to identify women needing immunization against german measles (rubella) to prevent birth defects,

40 other diagnostic blood tests,

61 bacteriological and viral cultures,

160 tests of individual and municipal water systems to monitor drinking water quality.

2 schools were inspected for the presence of asbestos.

Statewide, 247 emergency medical technicians were trained, 344 were recertified and 61 received advanced training; 188,323 doses of vaccine were supplied to private physicians, school nurses, and other health providers; 17 hospitals and 46

nursing homes were inspected and licensed; 1,880 restaurants were inspected; 4,432 venereal disease office visits and/or treatments were paid for and 745 contacts were traced; material to test 48,770 persons for tuberculosis was distributed to private physicians, public clinics, and schools; 21 x-ray machines were inspected; treatment for 20,144 children was approved and paid for in total or in part by the Tooth Fairy and Denticaid programs; and, in conjunction with Planned Parenthood, 13,380 persons received contraceptive counselling and service.

Technical assistance was provided through the office of Local Health Services to your Town Health Officer, Robert Eaton.

Your Town Clerk, Emily E. Hood, received support and instruction in the handling of vital records from the division of Public Health Statistics.

THETFORD TOWN - LATHAM MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The Thetford Town - Latham Memorial Library, a member of the Library Federation, added over 1,000 books to its collection this past year. This makes the total book holdings around 10,500. In addition to this the Library borrows four times a year for a three month period, over 200 books from the Regional Library in St. Johnsbury, and participates in Inter-Library Loan. Presently it will be adding more children's books thanks to the generosity of the Thetford Mother's Club and friends of Mrs. Dorothy Davison who gave money in her memory. New magazine subscriptions also will be added and several reference and professional books.

Once again the Library is sponsoring a Story Time for pre-school children with Miss Eleanor Cadbury helping. The elementary school classes visit twice a month for stories and to borrow books. We also cooperate with the Academy by supplementing books for term papers and special projects. The Summer Reading Program ran for eight weeks and included movies, stories and alternating music and art periods. A Summer Read-a-thon by the children collected over \$30 for the purchase of books. This program involved several volunteers and a high school youth experience worker.

The Library fulfilled both Step I and Step II requirements of the State Library System and received a grant of \$1,000. With this grant we are buying a display case, additional paperback books for the Young Adult collection, several magazine subscriptions and additional adult books.

Altogether there are over thirty volunteers that give countless hours to the Library. I am especially grateful to the hard working Board that has encouraged many new innovations in the library and has supported me in my endeavors. The Library Board meets on the first Wednesday of the month at 7:30 P.M. in the Library, and is open to the public.

We feel we have a fine town library and are grateful to the many people who work and contribute books and other material. We encourage more townspeople to come and see what the library has to offer.

REPORT OF THETFORD LIBRARY FEDERATION, INC.

Operations

Our member libraries continued to give active service during the year. Latham Memorial Library expanded its open hours to Saturdays, and through the Federation qualified for another state grant for operations.

The Federation trustees appointed a committee which under Robert Johnston has worked out a policy for public use of library buildings, commencing with the large basement room in the Bicentennial Building. The library cooperation committee has been active under Marian Fifield, and is planning a series of free state films during the winter. We are hoping in the near future to purchase some audio-visual equipment which can be jointly used by member libraries.

Fund-Raising

In the fund-raising drive beginning in August 1978, 119 donors gave a total of \$5,780.00. In the drive which began in August 1979, 71 donors have so far given \$3,912.00. Through these drives, and through funds from the estates of Richard and Claire Fowle, we have paid off the last \$4,000 of our \$300,000 building loan, and have made a start on an endowment. We are almost completely dependent on a grant from the Town to maintain our regular operations.

Officers

William Slade, one of the founders of the Federation, and President during the past seven years, tendered his resignation at the November board meeting. The board accepted his resignation with great regret, recognizing his devotion to the purposes and operation of the Federation and his remarkable effectiveness as a fund-raiser. Mr. Slade was elected President-Emeritus and will be in charge of raising the endowment fund. Susan Voake was elected President pro tempore in his place.

PEABODY LIBRARY

The Peabody Library is open an afternoon and an evening each week of the year. Except during baseball season, children's movies are shown every Wednesday evening. All children are welcome.

High school students frequently come in to use our reference books. We have an excellent encyclopedia, a large selection of biographies and art books.

We are members of the Thetford Library Federation which has provided the funds to heat Peabody during the winter months.

Our workers are all volunteers, and our income is small. We are grateful for donations and patronage of our annual Book and Bake sale.

REPORT OF THETFORD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Meetings

We have kept up our fall and winter meetings. In February, at a meeting on 'Winter in Vermont', one feature was a talk by William Worcester on The First Skis in Vermont. This talk was taped and typed up, and was bought by *Vermont Life*, which published it in the November issue. At our annual meeting in August, State Archeologist Giovanna Neudorfer talked to a packed audience at the Elementary School about her views of the stone structures in Vermont - that they are root cellars and house foundations, rather than sun temples. Our November meeting at Thetford Center heard reminiscences by Guy Aldrich.

Library

Our historical library was open two mornings a week in the summer, and by appointment at other times. A good deal of time this summer was spent going through a dozen boxes of books and other materials from the Richard Fowle house. Most of our books are catalogued, and we continue to make progress in organizing our archival material.

We receive a steady stream of requests for genealogical material, largely answered by letter by Louise Vaughan. Two scholars who have come back regularly for material are Prof. Lee from the University of Kentucky, working on the Charles Farnsworth papers, and Prof. Ruth Zinar of Hunter College, working on district schools.

Museum

At our annual meeting we had a special ceremony naming the Barn Museum for Charles and Fannie Hughes, in honor of their forty years of devoted work in building up and maintaining the collection. We had our museum opening on 25 and 26 August. The foundation walls have been strengthened, the wagon shed gravelled and regraded, and the wagon collection completely rearranged.

Financial

On the settling of the Claire Fowle estate in October, the trustees voted to transfer to Thetford Library Federation \$18,000, part to help pay off the remainder of the building loan, the remainder to start an endowment for the operation and improvement of the Bicentennial Building.

SAWNEY BEAN

There have been many different spellings of the name of this area of Thetford, but over the years there seems to have been little question as to the pronunciation. It has always been pronounced as Saw-ney, not Swan-ey Bean. In fact in the Town Report of 1882 it was spelled Sonney Bean.

The word sawney is an old English word commonly used in the 18th and 19th centuries. It can still be found occasionally in English books of that time. Therefore it would have been a word known and used when Sawney Bean was first settled around the time of the Revolutionary War.

Several years ago I had a friend visiting me whose grandparents came from England around 1860. When she heard me speak of Sawney Bean she immediately became very much interested and told me this story: "As a young girl she lived near her English grandparents. Her grandfather was a jolly old man and a great tease. Her grandmother was more serious and did not enjoy being teased. If she really became annoyed with his teasing she would turn to him and exclaim, "You old sawney'".

This reinforces the fact that the word sawney was commonly used with the same meaning and pronunciation even unto the 20th century, as given in three different unabridged dictionaries. Two use the spelling sawney and one lists both sawney and sawnee. There is no such word as swaney or swanee listed in any of the three.

These meanings seem to strengthen Mrs. Slade's theory that Sawney was a nickname for a man named Bean. No Bean is listed as living in Thetford in the census

of 1771 or in the lists of Freeman made from 1779-1785. But there were Beans who lived in both Strafford and West Fairlee. Eliphalet Bean and Thomas Bean, both of Strafford served in the Revolutionary War. James Bean of Strafford, whose name is often linked with that of James Pennock, was a Tory, as was Pennock. They both left Strafford during the war.

At the close of the war James Pennock returned to Strafford. Evidently he was forgiven and later became a prominent citizen of the town. He is buried in the "Old City Cemetery". Therefore it seems likely that he lived not too far from the Thetford town line. His daughter married Daniel West and they settled on the land where Camp Kokosing is located. West was suspected of Tory sympathies, chiefly because he was the son-in-law of James Pennock. Fearing that his farm might be confiscated he sold it to David Miller for whom Miller's Pond is named. This section of Strafford borders on the Sawney Bean area of Thetford.

Could this neighborhood near the Thetford line have been an enclave of Loyalists? Could James Bean have lived here? Could Sawney Bean have been named for a Strafford, not a Thetford Bean?

Although the Strafford section of this area was settled before the Revolutionary War, there is no record of settlement in the Thetford section until 1792. In that year J. Tyler, a veteran of the Revolutionary War, bought 80-100 acres of land for 200 lbs. in lot 115. Tradition claims that J. Tyler built the house, still standing on this land and long known as the Harvey Burr place. If true it would be one of the oldest houses in town. It is now owned by Lanna, Dowler and Cook.

The name Sawney Bean has been applied traditionally to a very large indefinite section of Thetford. It was a region of large farms, pasture lands, and forests. There was never an actual center with a few houses clustered about a store, church, or school. Most inhabitants did their trading in Post Mills. A number of farmers in Post Mills had pastures and wood lots "out Sawney Bean".

Over the years many stories and even more varied spellings of the unusual name of this beautiful area of Thetford have evolved. I have adopted the explanation of the name and its spelling used by Thetford's long time historian, Mary B. Slade. Mrs. Slade used the spelling, Sawney, in all her writing, as does Charles Latham in his "A Short History of Thetford."

The Orange County map engraved by H. F. Walling and published by Baker and Tilden in 1858 used the spelling Sawney Bean. Charles Latham used this map as a basis for his 1960 map of Thetford and continued the same spelling Sawney Bean.

C. S. Davis was born and brought up in Post Mills. His father owned the Lake Fairlee Inn and the Lake House located where the cement dock is today. In his article, including a map, on "Post Mills and Fairlee Lake about 1875", he made this positive statement: "the road leads on to Sawney Bean not to Swaney Bean or any other kind of bean that may be indicated on later maps."

Union Village Church

The United Methodist Women's Group, of the Union Village Church, is rather small, but hard working. Each year we work at Norwich Fair. We send gifts and clothes to the patients at the State hospital, and also many cards, flowers and plants. We also give cheer boxes, complete Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners, to shut in and needy families; make donations to oversea missions, the Methodist Children's Hospital and orphanage; sponsor Christmas parties for the community children, and help to maintain the necessary inside repairs of the church, parsonage and Parish House. To accomplish this we have several suppers.

THE MEN'S GOODFELLOWSHIP GROUP

Union Village Church

The Men's Goodfellowship Group of the Union Village Church, is a small but active group. Besides working at the Norwich Fair, we also share the expenses of Cheer boxes, Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners, with the Women's Group. We maintain all necessary outside repairs for the Church, parsonage and Parish House. We also donate to the church budget. We share in the work and expenses of all church suppers, to raise the necessary money.

GIRL SCOUTS

Girl Scouts have been active in the Town of Thetford since the fall of 1972. It is open to girls in grades 2 through 12. It is broken into four age levels: Brownie, Junior, Cadette and Seniors.

This year we have 49 girls registered and 15 adults, who give their time on a volunteer basis.

The girls learn many outdoor camping skills, boating, conservation, arts and crafts, and many other skills.

Many of the girls attend Camp Farnsworth in the summer for day camp as well as resident camp, which gives them an opportunity to meet girls from New Hampshire and Vermont.

THETFORD 4-H DAIRY CLUB

4-H is a voluntary educational program for boys and girls, ages 8 - 18, and is a part of the extension service of the University of Vermont. The emphasis in 4-H is "learning by doing".

In Thetford, we organized a dairy club three years ago, and this year have expanded, offering projects as woodworking, crafts, foods, clothing and veterinary science. We hope to add more projects next year. Anyone who has a skill to share and enjoys working with young people is welcome to join the program. Besides project meetings, monthly business meetings are held and members participate in many county and state events. Orange County Festival Day involves action exhibits, poster contest, clothing revue, and talent show, all for which an evaluation is given and winners are chosen to go on to state day. Similarly, children showing animals at Dairy Day and those judging on the county judging tour are evaluated and the best qualified go on to compete at state and national levels. At present, the 4-H Club in Thetford consists of eighteen members and five leaders.

NORTH THETFORD FRIENDLY CLASS

Our Ladies' Group meets the last Tuesday evening of each month, except for July and August. We open meetings with devotions, then continue with regular business meeting, with programs of varied activities. Devotions, programs, refreshments and Sunshine are usually done by different people each month. Money is earned by putting on monthly dinners for the Thetford Lions Club. Donations are given to local charities and our church. We also buy needed items for the church kitchen etc. Our group affiliates with our church and is represented at church Executive meetings by a voted member.

THETFORD SNOW COASTERS, INC.

Thetford's snowmobile club had a quiet winter last year. Trail rides were planned for every weekend, but the weather didn't cooperate. Snow Coasters is joining with the American Legion again this year in preparing the lunch for town meeting. We sent two children to conservation camp this year. The club has a land-owners Supper the first of April. Last year 200 people attended. The supper is for land-owners who have given permission to the club members to travel on trails across their property. This is one way we can thank them.

Anyone wishing to join may sign up at any meeting. Meetings are held on the third Thursday of each month.

THETFORD MOTHERS' CLUB

The Thetford Mothers' Club provides financial assistance to town organizations serving children, including the libraries, elementary school, scouting troops, and sports teams, and also runs Thetford's Well Child Clinics.

To finance these projects, the group holds fund-raising events including food sales, rummage sales, and Easter basket raffles.

The group also serves a social function for its members. Programs at meetings range from wreath-making workshops to Chinese cooking demonstrations. Meetings are the first Wednesday of most months September to June; there is also a potluck Christmas dinner for members and spouses.

Any Thetford mother is welcome to join; there are no dues. For information, contact President Lea Easton, 333-4025.

LADIES' BENEFIT SOCIETY

The Ladies' Benefit Society is a non-denominational woman's group meeting on the third Thursday of the month at their house on Route 244 in Post Mills. The activities include a Spring Rummage sale, Strawberry Festival, Summer Sale, Flea Market, an Apple Pie sale, and a Christmas tea. The money made supports the Post Mills Church, F.A.S.T. Squad, MHMH Chaplain's Fund, and the Post Mills and West Fairlee libraries. Money made from the raffle of a hand made quilt supports a Thetford Academicscholarship for a student in the area. The Ladies' Benefit Society welcomes new members.

**THETFORD RESIDENTS AND PROPERTY
OWNERS INFORMATION**

DOGS

All dogs four months of age and older must be licensed between January 1st and April 1st of each year. Before licensing the dog must have a rabies shot and a certificate on file in the Town Clerk's Office. Rabies shots are good for 27 months.

FEES: Neutered Male & Spayed Female \$4.00 Male \$6.00 Female \$8.00
 FEES after April 1st Neutered Male and Spayed Female \$6.00
 Male \$9.00 Female \$12.00

Dogs which move into Town after April 1st, or are licensed within 30 days of arrival, owners pay the regular fee. After 30 days they are liable for the late fees. Please report all deceased dogs to the Town Clerk's Office. Licenses may be obtained by mail.

"The owner or keeper of 3 or more dogs, four months of age or older, kept for sale or breeding purposes . . . shall apply to the Town Clerk for a kennel permit . . . Kennel permit expires March 31." 20 VSA 3681

PROPERTY TAX BILLS

Bills will be mailed out July 22, 1980 and are payable on that date. You have a 90 day grace period, ending October 22, 1980.

PAYMENTS OF TAX BILLS

All payments received in the hands of the Treasurer after the final grace period date are delinquent, regardless of the date on the check or postmark, and will be turned over to the Tax Collector.

All delinquent taxes will have a 8% penalty and a five cents warrant fee added plus interest of 1% each month. These are added the day they become delinquent and charges are not pro-rated.

CHECKLISTS

Voter registration for elections and town meetings close at 12:00 o'clock noon the third Saturday prior to voting. Application forms may be obtained at the bank or Town Clerk's Office. Anyone wishing to vote must make application, you are not automatically placed on the checklist.

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PERMITS NEEDED

Accesses from Highways

A written permit is required from the selectmen for any access from property to state aid roads and all town roads. Anyone building or wishing to drive to their property from these roads must obtain a permit.

Section 43: It shall be unlawful to develop, construct or regrade any driveway, entrance or approach, or build a fence or building, or deposit material of any kind within, or in any way affect the grade of, a highway right of way, or obstruct a ditch, culvert, or drainage course that drains a highway, or fill or grade the land adjacent to a highway so as to divert the flow of water onto the highway right of way, without a written permit from the Board of Selectmen. (V.S.A. 19: 1-43 Act 460)

Zoning Permits

No building construction or land development may commence, or no land structure may be devoted to a new or changed use within the Town without a Zoning Permit duly issued by the Zoning Administrator as provided for in Section 4443 of the Act. (Thetford Zoning Ordinance Article 8, Section 820)

A sewage disposal system construction permit must be obtained prior to the issuance of a zoning permit for a new dwelling.

On Site Sewage Disposal System

A person before constructing a sewage disposal system shall make application for a permit to construct, to the Local Board of Health, on the prescribed form, accompanied by a \$55.00 fee. A Sanitary Specialist will then inspect and test the proposed site, and give recommendations.

The Local Board of Health must issue a Construction Permit before any construction is done. The Sanitary Specialist is to be notified 48 hours in advance as to the date the system is to be installed, so that he can make an inspection during construction. After all requirements have been complied with, an Occupancy Permit will be issued.

Applications may be picked up and filed with the Town Clerk.

Sub-division

No subdivision of land may legally occur without a hearing before the Thetford Planning Commission. The placing of a second dwelling on a lot constitutes a subdivision (Thetford Subdivision Regulations, Section 2.39). Application forms and copies of the Thetford Subdivision Regulations are available at the Town Clerk's Office. Sometimes there can be confusion over the meaning of the Regulations. The Zoning and subdivision Administrator and/or members of the Thetford Planning Commission will be glad to try to informally answer questions. A subdivider is also welcome to come before the Planning Commission during one of its regularly scheduled meetings to ask questions. Meetings are held the first and fourth Tuesdays after the first Monday of the month, beginning at 7:30 PM in the Town Hall.

Flood Hazard Area Zoning By-Law

A comprehensive Flood Hazard Area Zoning By-Law was adopted by the Board of Selectmen on 31 July 1978. Copies of the new By-Law may be obtained at the Town Clerk's Office.
